CIVIL DEFENSE IS SUBJECT OF DEBATE  
ON SATURDAY; REAGAN ADMINISTRATORS  
TO PRESENT PLAN

Civil defense planning by government leaders has become a logical and natural task emanating from a defense policy whose centerpiece is readiness for nuclear confrontation. This Saturday, November 6 the government-proposed, \$4.2 billion civil defense program will be the subject of a day-long conference to be held from 9:30-4:00 p.m. in O'Hare.

Among the conference participants are John R. Brinkerhoff, Acting Associate Director for National Preparedness Programs, and John E. Dickey, Assistant Associate Director, Emergency Management Program Office. These gentlemen will present the Reagan administration's philosophy and plan for civil defense. Both are former military officers who spent overseas tours in Korea, Vietnam and Cyprus.

The conference, "Civil Defense: Sense and Nonsense," is sponsored by the Newport Institute, in cooperation with Salve Regina, and is a follow-up to the "Great Nuclear Debate" series held last spring. Saturday's panel discussion will explore civil defense planning as part of nuclear war strategy and examine the proposed seven year civil defense program. This planning includes relocation of two-thirds of the population, protection of essential workers and machinery and measures to protect key government officials necessary for decision-making continuity during and after a nuclear war. The "sense" and "nonsense" of this plan will be aired among conference speakers and participants during the course of the day.

Contestants in Salve's second annual dance marathon to be held November 12 and 13 expect to raise more than \$10,000 in pledges for the Rhode Island affiliate of the American Heart Association following completion of the 20-hour event.

The dance marathon, sponsored by the Student Life Senate in cooperation with the American Heart Association, will begin in Ochre Court's Great Hall at 7 p.m. Friday, November 12 and end at 3 p.m. Saturday. Continuous music will be provided by Lou Paz and the Musionics.

This year, 120 students (60 couples), will compete.

Spectators are invited to the marathon and may stop in at any hour during the two days. A \$1.00 donation (to go to the Heart Association) is requested; opportunities to make pledges will also be available during the entire contest.
