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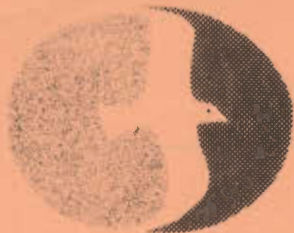

"EDUCATION VIA RADIO" TO SPOTLIGHT WANTON-LYMAN-HAZARD HOUSE

The Wanton-Lyman-Hazard house, thought to be the oldest home still standing in Newport today, will be the subject of discussion

on the upcoming "Education via Radio" program Wednesday, February 9, from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. on WADK, radio 1540. Daniel Snyder, director of the Newport Historical Society, is the scheduled guest.

The Wanton-Lyman-Hazard house, located on Broadway, was probably built in the late 1600's. It was once the home of loyalist Martin Howard who fled his home during the 1765 Stamp Act Riot. It was later purchased by John Wanton and when his heirs married, their names were added to the house. The house is now owned and operated as a museum by the Newport Historical Society.

"Education via Radio" is sponsored by Salve Regina - The Newport College in cooperation with WADK. It can be heard every other Wednesday through May 4, from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m.

## CRIMINAL JUSTICE MAJORS/MINORS

Commencing in September, 1983, Criminal Justice majors pursuing a Bachelor's degree will be allowed to apply a maximum of three (3) Criminal Justice Workshop credits to their CJ major. Workshop credits above this amount may be earned but will be applicable to general electives only. In addition, only three (3) credits for each Practicum (CJ 305 & CJ 306) will be applied towards the Criminal Justice major. The remaining Practicum credits can be used as general electives. This change will require each major to have at least thirty (30) credits in regular classroom work.

Students pursuing an Associate degree or CJ minor, are also limited to three (3) Criminal Justice Workshop credits. Additional Workshop credits may be applied by these students to general electives.

The above changes are applicable to current freshmen and sophomores. If you have any questions, please contact your advisor.
