CONCERTS AT OCHRE COURT

Salve Regina will present Do'a - World Music Ensemble in concert on Sunday, September 23 at 3:00 p.m. in Ochre Court. The five-member ensemble will perform original compositions on more than 70 instruments from around the world. These rarely-heard instruments will include North Indian bansri flutes, South American pan-pipes, West African balofon and adodo drums, Japanese biwa and Bolivian charango. Do'a's music bridges jazz, classical, folk and world music influences and has been acclaimed by jazz artist Dizzy Gillespie as "one of the important contributions to the future of our music."


Co-founded in 1974 by ensemble members Randy Armstrong and Ken LaRouche, Do'a has performed extensively in the United States and Canada through concerts, workshops, radio, television, film scores and multi-media dance presentations. They have also appeared at Lincoln Center and Carnegie Recital Hall in New York City. During recent engagements Do'a - World Music Ensemble has shared the stage with such noted artists as Larry Coryell, Dizzy Gillespie, the Paul Winter Consort, Richie Havens, Tom Rush, Mose Allison, Jonathan Edwards and David Bromberg.

Performing with the multi-instrumentalists, Armstrong and LaRouche, will be percussionist/composer Marty Quinn; free-lance jazz and classical bassist, John Hunter; and Charlie Jennison who performs on saxophones, flutes, keyboards and percussion.

The "Concerts at Ochre Court" series, now in its seventh season, will consist of three concerts for the academic year, September 1984-May 1985. Do'a - World Music Ensemble will be the first concert offered. It is open to the public and funded in part by the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts, the New England Foundation for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Selected works from "Raku and Smoke North America," a ceramic exhibition co-sponsored last April by Salve Regina and the Newport Art Museum, will be on display at the American Crafts Museum in New York City from September 14 through November 4, 1984.

Twenty-two pieces were selected from the original 69 exhibited during the six-week show. Selection for the New York exhibit was made by Jay Lacouture, the show's guest curator and chairman of Salve Regina's art department and Paul Smith, director of the American Crafts Museum.

The Newport Art Museum's exhibit, "Raku and Smoke North America," was widely acclaimed by art critics and ceramic artists as being one of the best ceramic shows to date in New England. Over 300 artists from the U.S. and Canada submitted work to the juried Newport competition. The exhibition was one of several ceramic shows in New England which recognized the International Academy of Ceramics meeting and the National Council for Education of the Ceramic Arts Conference held in Boston last April.

FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Ascanio DiPippo, Professor of Chemistry, has been appointed Inspector Chemist-Pollution Control for Dyer Island Yacht Club, Dyer Island, R.I.

Dr. Laurel End, Assistant Professor of Psychology, was honored this past summer by being invited to present the results of her doctoral research at an international "Conference on Knowledge and Language," held in Warsaw, Poland. Her paper, entitled "Comprehension of Metaphors: Priming the Ground," will be published shortly.

Dr. End's "Processing Strategies for Listening and Reading," co-authored with R. Horowitz and S.J. Samuels, will also appear soon as a chapter in the textbook entitled "Comprehending Oral and Written Language."

Father Eugene Hillman, Chairman of the graduate program in Liberal Studies, has been appointed to the Board of Trustees of Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. The institution is the largest Catholic school of theology in the United States, serving twenty-five religious orders of men, plus numerous sisters and lay people. The faculty includes the distinguished Edward Schillebeeckx of Holland.

FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Anthony Walsh, Chairman of Salve Regina's Psychology Department, has been reappointed Adjunct Professor of Psychology at Brown University for another two years. First appointed Adjunct Professor in 1982, Dr. Walsh is currently doing research at Brown University with Dr. Lewis Lipsitt, Director of the world renowned Child Study Center. They are working conjointly on a project related to the history of psychology.

Dr. Walsh will also have a paper published in a forthcoming issue of "Communique," published by the National Association of School Psychologists. The paper deals with the trial of a nine-year-old boy from Maine in the mid-1830's. Psychiatric testimony was introduced in an attempt to free the boy of criminal responsibility due to mental defect. The paper is being published at the invitation of the editor of "Communique."
