JAPANESE POTTER TO LEAD WORKSHOP AT SALVE

Japanese artist Toshio Ohi will lead a ceramics workshop on Thursday, October 3 and Friday, October 4 in Salve Regina's ceramic studio located in Mercy Hall. The workshop will begin both days at 10:00 a.m. and conclude at 4:00 p.m.

Ohi's work was recently exhibited in the College's McKillop Gallery during Newport's Black Ships Festival. An eleventh generation potter, he is a native of Kanazawa, Japan where his family has made ceramic objects for over 350 years. Ohi is a graduate of Tamagawa University in Tokyo and a master of fine arts graduate from the artisanry program at Boston University. This will be his last workshop in the United States before returning to his native country.

In addition to the workshop, Ohi will give a slide lecture presentation on Thursday, October 3 in Mercy Hall on the College campus at 7:00 p.m. Both the workshop and slide lecture presentation are free and open to the public.

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SALVE REGINA TO HOST THE RHODE ISLAND INTERCOLLEGIATE WOMEN'S DOUBLES GRASS TENNIS TOURNAMENT AT NEWPORT'S TENNIS HALL OF FAME

Salve Regina will host the Rhode Island Intercollegiate Women's Doubles Grass Tennis Tournament on Sunday, October 13, 11:00 a.m. at the International Tennis Hall of Fame in Newport. Salve Regina along with Bryant College, Rhode Island College, Brown University, University of Rhode Island, Providence College and Roger Williams College will each send three doubles teams to the tournament. The 42 players will compete in three flights. The single elimination tournament will utilize U.S. Tennis Association rules without officials. The Van Alen Simple Scoring system will be used.

Trophies, supplied by the R.I. Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women, will be awarded to the top three schools. A permanent plaque displaying the winning team will be donated by Mr. Paul Cardoza, Director of Physical Education at Salve Regina, and will be mounted at the Tennis Hall of Fame. Mr. Cardoza served as the Director and Coordinator of the first Rhode Island Intercollegiate Women's Doubles Grass Tennis Tournament which was held last year. Jerri DiCamillo, the new varsity tennis coach at the College, will continue Mr. Cardoza's efforts in organizing the women's intercollegiate tournament.
