

"NEW ENGLAND CHRISTMASTIDE" IN CONCERT

The Wednesday Noon Concert Series continues on December 7 in Cecilia Hall with a special seasonal program featuring members of the highly successful recording "New England Christmastide" on North Star Records. These Rhode Island based musicians perform on acoustic folk instruments in the spirit of old New England, drawing from a variety of musical traditions including classical, traditional, Irish, folk and sea chanteys.

Conceived and produced by Otis Read, the first recording featured 14 Rhode Island musicians who gathered in a small studio during the summer of 1985. North Star Records predicted sales of 500 copies that first holiday season. Since then, 120,000 copies have been sold, and sales are expected to reach 150,000 by the end of this season. A second volume has been added, and both have gained national and international critical acclaim. The album was listed as a "Best Bet" in the December issue of Rhode Island Monthly Magazine.

In a rare live performance, six of the original 12 performers will appear playing a wide variety of instruments including recorder, pipes, mandolin, guitar, hurdy-gurdy, vielle, whistle and concertina. Featured performers include Catherine Hawkes, Steve Jobe, Marilyn Mair, Mark Davis, Jon Campbell and Everett Brown.

This concert is partially funded by the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts and North Star Records.

The Salve Regina College Band and Jazz Combo will perform in concert in a Yuletide Music Fest on Sunday, December 4 at 3 p.m. in Cecilia Hall. The ensembles, under the direction of Bruce Abbott, will present a program of band classics and holiday favorites including an audience sing-a-long. Refreshments will be served at a reception following the program.

CHRISTMAS CHORAL CONCERT

The Music Department presents a choral Christmas concert on December 9 and 10 at 8 p.m. in Ochre Court. In keeping with the theme, "Cathedral, Court and Countryside," the choristers will feature selections of holiday music as sung throughout Christianity's ages.

Cathedral songs will include "Once In Royal David's City" and "Praise Ye The Lord," and a madrigal chorus will then appear in Medieval costume to recreate a Medieval court and sing tunes like "Good King Wenceslas." The countryside section will feature more popularly-known holiday selections, such as "The Twelve Days of Christmas" and "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus." Interspersed throughout the program, traditional Christmas carols may inspire the audience to join in song.

Tickets cost \$4 for general admission (\$2 for senior citizens and persons with Salve ID) and will go on sale November 28. Tickets must be purchased from the Music Department in advance as they will not be available at the door.

FACULTY NEWS

On November 9, 1988, Paul Cardoza, Chairperson, Physical Education Department, assumed the responsibilities of President of the Rhode Island Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (RIAPERD). The passing of the gavel took place at the General Session during the association's Fall Conference held at the Sheraton Islander in Newport. Over 250 professionals attended. The RIAHPERD is a professional organization dedicated to the promotion of sound programs of health, physical education, recreation and dance in the public and private schools, colleges, universities, and communities in the State of Rhode Island.

A paper prepared by Stephanie Muri, Associate Professor of Social Work, was selected in a juried process for presentation at the National Association of Social Workers' annual symposium in Philadelphia, November 9 - 11. Stephanie represented the Social Work Department and Salve Regina College at the symposium. Her paper, "Women Understanding Women: a Report on the Latest Research on Women's Development," addressed current research on women by women on the cognitive, emotional, relational and moral aspects of women's development.

Lois Wims, Instructor of Administration of Justice, lectured on the topic "Domestic Violence" at the November 14 meeting of East Providence/Cranston Business and Professional Women's Associations. Wims presented information on new developments -- more arrests, increased numbers of shelters and current laws -- designed to protect women against domestic violence.



Brother John Buckley, Professor of History, attended the Northeastern Political Science and Northeast International Studies conference on November 11 and 12 at the Omni Biltmore Hotel in Providence. Topics include the 1988 election and an agenda of crucial issues facing the nation in the 1990s.

Dr. Karen Murphy, Associate Professor of Management, participated in a symposium, "Palestinians and Israelis: Perspectives on the Uprising," sponsored by Rhode Island College on October 18. She presented her observations based upon field research conducted in the Gaza Strip and West Bank of Israel during August, 1988. In addition, the Association of Arab-American University Graduates (Belmont, Mass.) invited Dr. Murphy to become a member of their Speakers Bureau in the Palestinian issue section.

On November 17, Dr. Murphy attended a National closed-circuit video teleconference, "Ethics in American Business," which was presented by PBS National Narrowcast Service in association with the Ethics Resource Center. This interactive teleconference was sponsored locally by Johnson & Wales University.

Patricia Hatfield, Assistant Director of Public Relations, has had poetry published in the Fall, 1988 issue of the The Newport Review, a journal of Art, Literature and Ideas partially funded by the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts.
