A symposium on Herman Hesse, the late German existentialist and Nobel Prizewinning author, will be held Wednesday evening (April 29) at Salve Regina College.

Sponsored by the College's new Christian Life Center, in cooperation with the departments of English, philosophy, and theology, the symposium will begin at 7 p. m. in the Twombly-Burden Room of the O'Hare Academic Center on the Newport campus.

Perspectives on Hesse will be offered by Sr. Barbara Marie Colavecchio, R. S. M., of the Salve Regina English department; Sr. Lois Eveleth, R. S. M., of the philosophy department, and Rev. Richard Mandeville, of the theology department. Moderating the symposium will be Rev. Christopher Johnson, O. P., director of the Christian Life Center and College Chaplain. The symposium will be open to the public free of charge.

Sr. Barbara's symposium topic will be "The Divided Character of Herman Hesse." Sr. Lois will discuss his "Man As Incomplete." Father Mandeville will deal with the author's "Rhythm of Humanization."

The Christian Life Center, established at Salve Regina College in 1970, endeavors to provide in the collegiate environment an overall climate for the effective transmission of the universal values of living as annunciated in the Judaic-Christian tradition. The Center has as its goals the development of the total personality, the realization of the individual's potential for moral commitment, and the maximization of communication between the faculty, the administration, the students, and the community.
