SEPTEMBER 24 - A DAY TO CELEBRATE

All associated with Salve Regina College should be aware that Friday, September 24 is the feast of our Lady of Mercy. This is the patronal feast of the Sisters of Mercy under whose sponsorship the college exists.

Celebration and patronage, and a sense of the spiritual are values that have meaning in our lives today as they had in the past. The means we take to articulate them change with the times. In "Ebb Tide," October 1948, we read:

September 24, Mercy Day, found us assembled
in the chapel dressed in the traditional sodality
white dresses and blue veils. His Excellency,
our Most Reverend Bishop McVinney celebrated
the Mass for this happy occasion.

We smile at the lost world of the 40's and its return is not being suggested. Friday, September 24, however, can well be the occasion for a reflective thought on Mary in her role as Mother of Mercy, the life dedication of a Sister of Mercy to education, and just the human need we all have for occasions of celebration. September 24, Mercy Day, is such an occasion for the Sisters of Mercy and all associated with them who are the SRC community.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES PROFESSOR NAMED CO-EDITOR

Dr. Frank Maguire, Professor, Religious Studies Department, has been appointed co-editor of the new journal "Religious Media Today," a publication devoted to a critical review of communications resources for religious educators. Among Dr. Maguire's responsibilities will be attending editorial policy decision making meetings, assisting in the quarterly publication of the journal, contracting scholars in their respective fields of expertise to write book reviews, and writing book reviews himself.

Shannon, Readings in Bioethics and Charles Curran, New Perspectives in Moral Theology which will appear in the Spring '77 issue of "Religious Media Today".
