PARKING AND TRAFFIC PATTERN

Because of road construction on Ochre Point Avenue, all students are requested to observe the construction barricades placed along the avenue for parking restrictions and traffic control. Parking within the barricades could result in damage to your vehicle by the construction equipment. Parking has been made available on the Wakehurst grounds, for students who have registered their car with the College Security Department. Registration may be made at the Security Office in the basement of Miley Hall.

Upon completion of construction work along Ochre Point Avenue, the traffic pattern within the area of Angelus, McAuley Hall and O'Hare Academic Center will be changed to one-way. Traffic will enter the campus at Marion Hall and exit at the Gatehouse onto Ochre Point Avenue. Appropriate signs will be installed indicating the traffic pattern.
