Dear Sir,

I have to acknowledge your letter & I am waiting a reply from Mr. Roberts. I have written to ask him if he can arrange not to have the cases opened in Paris, as they are tin-lined. There is a slight duty for goods going into France - but not much.

I was extremely sorry I have had to trouble you with these

details about the declaration for America - but the people at your Consul make all kinds of difficulties - hence my letter to you.

I am always at your orders if I can do anything for you here & I have no doubt, on hearing from Mr Roberts, it will all be arranged - At present your cases are at Tilbury's & insured - we could not get them in here, so I had nothing else to do but to send them there -
