Dr. John F. Quinn, Peace Dale, R. I., a professor of education and former vice president at the University of Rhode Island, has been elected chairman of the College's 10-member board of trustees. A former member of SRC's advisory board, which he had served as chairman for five years, Dr. Quinn was among the first laymen elected to the board of trustees in 1967. He succeeds the late Cornelius C. Moore, Newport, who was board chairman at the time of his death last August.

The Alliance Francaise at SRC marked the twentieth anniversary of their founding with a reception and banquet in the State Dining Room of Ochre Court. Guests of honor at the banquet were Monsieur Daniel Oriez, consul general of France in Boston, and Monsieur George I. Duca, director of the Federation of Alliances Francaises, New York City. Other guests included four of the 12 former winners of the Alliance's "Summer Study in Paris" awards, one of whom was Miss Susan A. Edward, Middletown, a SRC graduate. Bringing the greetings of the College to the festivities was SRC president, Sr. Mary Christopher, R. S. M., who is president of the Providence and Newport Senior Alliances Francaises. The officers of the local chapter were also on hand, as were members of SRC's French department. The latter group included professor Georgette V. Ramos, who founded the Alliance Francaise at Salve Regina in 1950.

A Welcome to the SRC community is heartily extended to two new members of the faculty whose names were inadvertently omitted from the November edition of Happenings: Sr. Margaret Murphy, instructor in mathematics, and Sr. Marie Corinne Walsh, assistant professor of education, and director of elementary education.

Some 250 fathers from a dozen states were on the SRC campus for the ninth annual Father-Daughter Weekend. The visiting Dads joined their daughters in a round of activities including tours, receptions, classroom visitation, speeches, an annual business meeting, dinner, dance, and a guitar Mass. A focal point of the traditional Weekend, sponsored by the Salve Regina Fathers Council, was "A Kaleidoscope of Learning," a series of special presentations by several of the College's academic departments, admissions office, and Christian Life Center.

The SRC Guild welcomed the College's freshmen and their mothers last month at a reception held in Ochre Court. The reception, sponsored annually by the Guild, gave Guild members and their guests an opportunity to get acquainted and hear brief informal reports of campus life by members of the administration and faculty, Guild counselors, and club moderators.

The Student National Education Association at SRC participated in "Speak Out," a day-long forum on teacher education, held simultaneously at almost every major teacher training institution in New England, and designed to represent the first phase in a student-initiated action to bring about comprehensive reform in teacher education. SRC's program incorporated the theme of "New Trends and Needed Changes" into static displays, audio-visual demonstrations, and panel discussions. Coordinating the campus event were the Misses Mary Margaret Gontarz '73, and Linda Wygant '72, while Miss Anne Breton '74 served as one of six state coordinators for the entire New England program.

SRC's chapter of SNEA recently sponsored an audio-visual workshop on campus. Special guest for the event was Mr. Joseph Travers, director of the audio-visual center at Middle School, Middletown, R. I.

Miss Anne Breton '74 attended a SNEA-sponsored New England Regional Conference, held in Groton, Mass.

The Christian Life Center's FLICKS '70 (Focusing Life in Cinema, Keynotes, and Symposia) presented the second of a five-part series on Dimensions of Man with a Keynote on "Social Man" by Jerrold A. Nussbaum, instructor in sociology; the film, The Subject Was Roses; and a subsequent symposium presented by Dr. Lester Carr, vice president for academic affairs, and Mr. Nussbaum. Moderating the programs was Rev. Christopher Johnson, O. P., director of the College's Christian Life Center.

A responsive audience, representing various constituencies of the Salve and Newport communities, were on campus for a special lecture by Dr. Robert F. Delaney, a noted writer, lecturer, and communications specialist, who spoke on the topic of "Communicating With Youth," Dr. Delaney, a former director of the Edward R. Murrow Center of Public Diplomacy, Tufts University, is currently president of the Thunderbird Graduate School of International Management, Phoenix, Ariz.

The glee clubs of SRC and St. Michael's College, Winooski, Vt., sang a combined November concert, featuring the music for brass and chorus of Giovanni Gabrieli and Daniel Pinkham. Conducting the 44-voice SRC glee club was Mr. Glenn Giuttari. Accompanists were Sr. Marianne Postiglione, chairman of the music division of the creative arts department, and Miss Jeanne Roy, '71. Although this program was SRC's first full concert of the season, the glee club did present a "mini-concert" during the College's recent Father-Daughter Dance on campus.

Some 35 blind women of Rhode Island attended an afternoon program at SRC as the guests of the state's chapter of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae. The annual visit included a special Mass, dinner, and entertainment. Members of Student Action Core served as hostesses for the five-hour program, and assisted in accompanying the guests throughout the day's spiritual and social activities.

The Spanish Club held its second meeting of the semester with seniors Kathy Augenthaler and Mary Amodeo summarizing the highpoints of an art course taken at the Prado Museum during their recent stay in Madrid.

Mr. Stanley Grashow, assistant professor of creative arts and chairman of the department, was the guest speaker at a meeting of the local AAUW chapter in Ochre Court. His program included a slide presentation and a discussion on modern art.

Mrs. Dorothea P. Dutra, chairman of the department of nursing, attended a meeting of the National League for Nursing Council on Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Programs, in Miami, Florida. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss preparation of professional nurses in educational institutions, particularly preparation of the nurse with diploma school education; and to vote for the College's department of nursing, as a delegate to the business session.

Sister Mary Marjorie Walsh, director of career guidance and placement, and Sr. Marie Corinne Walsh, assistant professor of education and director of elementary education, attended a November Peace Corps Campus Liaison Conference at Boston College. Speakers for the event included: Charles S. Amorosino, Jr., New England Area Coordinator; Joseph H. Blatchford, National Director of Peace Corps; Robert McKay, Director of Volunteer Recruitment; and John Pincetich, Director of the Northeast Region.

Rev. Richard E. Mandeville, instructor in theology, was interviewed on WPRO Radio, Providence, on his theological impressions of the rock opera "Jesus Christ, Superstar." The program will be aired again both locally and country-wide at later dates, and may be used by record companies in promoting similar programs.

Naval Reserve Public Affairs Company 1-1, commanded by LCDR Ronald C. Brinn, vice president for development and public relations, joined forces with the First Naval District in conducting a two-day public affairs seminar--the first of its kind in the country. Participating in the Boston seminar were almost 100 public affairs personnel--Regular Navy, Reservists, and civilians --from the five-state District. On hand to deliver the seminar's keynote address was RADM L.R. Geis, the Navy's Chief of Information.

Sister Mary Jeannette Pivin, assistant professor of theology, was on hand to discuss the liturgy at a recent meeting of the Serra Club of Newport, held at the La Forge Casino Restaurant, Newport.

Mr. Robert J. McKenna, assistant professor of political science, addressed the social studies class at Rogers High School. His topic was "The Political Implications and Present Day Parallels of the Depression."
