Sir - An agent of Mr Robert
Goelt called on me yesterday in
reference to some cases of his clients
involving the antiquity question,
as applied to certain goods imported
from Spain and now at Mr Goelt's

Hamilton to examine the goods
in question, as an expert on the
part of the Collector, and it struck
