Miss Catherine M. Sullivan, Tampa, Fla., has joined the faculty of Salve Regina College, Newport, R.I. as an associate professor of nursing and coordinator of the counseling center.

As a consultant at the University of San Marcos, Lima, Peru, and director of nursing education at the National University of San Marcos from 1966-1970, Miss Sullivan devised the first collegiate nursing program in Latin America.

A native of New York City and a graduate of Salve Regina, Miss Sullivan earned her master of science degree in psychiatric-mental health nursing at Catholic University.

A member of a number of professional organizations including the American Nurse Association, the Rhode Island Association on Mental Health, Miss Sullivan is currently serving as chairman of the Rhode Island State Nurses Association's Division of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nursing. She also holds membership in Sigma Theta Tau and Pi Gamma Nu, social science and nursing honorary societies.

She is the daughter of Mrs. Eleanor Sullivan, 10,000 Connechusetts Rd., Tampa, Fla.
