SIX SALVE STUDENTS WILL ATTEND WASHINGTON INTERNSHIPS

Six students have been chosen to attend the Washington Internship Program from March 5 - 9, 1979. Stephen Malley and Kevin J. Logue will be working for Senator Pell; Auredina Gonslaves and Lewis Bower, Jr. will be in the office of Senator Chafee; and Representative Beard will be assisted by Kathleen Hannon and James McNamara, Jr.

This will be the 19th consecutive year that students from The Newport College - Salve Regina will be attending an Internship Program in Washington, D.C. This program was initiated in 1961 by the then-freshman U.S. Senator Claiborne Pell. Since that time Representative Edward P. Beard instituted a similar Internship Program upon his election; and Senator John H. Chafee also has begun his own Internship Program.

The Internship Program allows students to spend one week in the Washington office of a United States Senator or Representative and to act as a temporary employee of the Member. They have an opportunity to observe committee meetings, see action on the floor of the House and Senate, and to attend sessions of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Any interested member of the college community is cordially invited.

Below is the complete text of the Equal Rights Amendment:

Section 1.

Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Section 2.

The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this Article.

Section 3.

This Amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.

FACULTY NEWS

Mark Sottnick, an Art Lecturer, has been awarded a \$14,000 grant by the Rhode Island Committee for the Humanities to make a 16-mm film on the subject of death and dying.

Mr. Sottnick is presently teaching a course on film at The College. The movie will be an adaptation of the Grimm Brothers' "Godfather Death," in which a dying father makes a pact with Death in order

to save his young daughter's life. The daughter grows up to be a doctor who tries to cheat Death in an attempt to save her patients' lives, but learns that no one can avoid dying.

Film production will begin the week of March 11, under the auspices of a local theatrical group. Sottnick will produce, direct, and write the film, while Denis Maloney, whose credits include CBS' Captain Kangaroo, will provide the camerawork. Newport artist David Jorgenson will make original woodcuts for background scenery, and Diana Norman will supply costumes. Actors will be local professionals and children.

Additional funding for the film comes from a \$3,000 grant from the Louis B. Mayer Fellowship, courtesy of the Yale University Media Design Studio, and from area matching funds.
