SAFETY NOTE

VANDALISM: What is Vandalism? It is the deliberate and pointless damage of property---(personal or private) sometimes called "ripping up," "trashing," "yard farming," etc.

Whatever it is called, vandalism is not a "harmless prank" it is a crime that wastes time and money, a national loss of \$1 billion per year and causes suffering and even death. In colleges throughout America, vandalism is rapidly increasing. Thousands of incidents are reported every year. At least twice as many are unreported.

Whenever vandalism occurs YOU PAY, directly when your own property is damaged and indirectly via higher taxes to repair and replace public property and via higher insurance cost.

Help keep your College Community safe from vandalism, because vandalism hurts everyone.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Personal property is your responsibility. Protect it from theft; all items of value should be identified with your name and/or social security number. Make a record of all valuables. Keep the record in a safe place.

Never leave personal property such as pocketbook, brief case or packages lying on the seat of your car. Place them in the trunk of your car or cover them up with something.
