## ATTENTION NURSING STUDENTS

The Nursing Department is seeking applications from those students who have already met the requirements of Steps 1 and 2 of the "Requirements for Admission to the Nursing Department."

All such applications will be carefully considered and decisions made in time for spring pre-registration. Applicants interested in applying should so signify in writing prior to March 28, 1980. The written application should contain a specific rationale for requesting admission, and a letter of recommendation from a person not a member of the student's family should accompany the application.

## FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Frank D. Maguire will give a lecture entitled "The Papacy and Hans Kueng" in which he will discuss the central issues of the case as well as situating them within the greater framework of the exercise of authority and freedom within the Catholic tradition of Christianity. The lecture will take place at Channing Memorial Church in Newport on Sunday, March 30, 1980 at 11:00 a.m.

Dr. Maguire will also deliver two lectures and lead two discussions in connection with the Rhode Island Committee for the Humanities'(RICH) sponsorship of Mark Sottnick's film "Godfather Death." These events will take place on Thursday, March 27, 1980 at 7:00 p.m. at the Providence Public Library and on Friday, March 28, 1980 at 12:30 p.m. at the Wanskuck Branch, Providence Public Library.

Sister Mary Smith, Archivist, will attend a two-day workshop the week of March 31 on the care and conservation of photographs, daguerreotypes, and glass negatives, at the Kennedy Library in Boston. There will be a tour of the Kennedy Library Exhibition and a discussion of mounting and exhibition methods as well as methods of identification and dating photographic material.

Speakers from MIT Historical Collections, Peabody Museum at Harvard and Mystic Seaport Museum will be there. Mr. William W. Moss, Chief Archivist of the Kennedy Library will host the workshop.

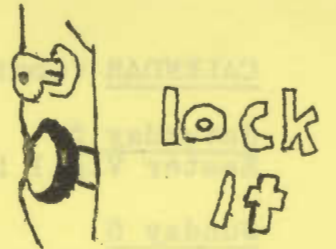
