

SALVE JUNIOR WINS NATIONAL AWARD

Salve Regina College has won the Dr. Moses Leo Gitelson Leadership Award for the second time in a row. Linda Tessman of Bristol, Conn., a junior, is the first prize recipient of the leadership award. She was presented a certificate of award by Susan Aurelia Gitelson during the 12th Annual National Student Symposium in Washington D.C. on March 21. The symposium is sponsored by the Center for the Study of the Presidency. Senator Claiborne Pell was the main speaker at the awards presentation.

Last year Mark Gordon won the same prestigious award. This year he served as Fellow of the Center during the conference.

More than six hundred students representing most of the nation's colleges submitted essays. A politics major, Linda took the leadership award with her essay entitled: "Interdependence and Independence in the 1980's - Middle East and the United States." The Center also recognized ten other students for their essays. In addition to her certificate she was given \$200 and two books, "The Autobiography of Gerald Ford" and "Mandate Goals for Administration."

Linda is a graduate of Bristol Eastern High School in Connecticut where she was elected to the National Honor Society. Through the American Institute for Foreign Study, Linda spent her 1980 fall semester abroad. She traveled to Munich, Germany and Salzburg, Austria. She attended the University of Salzburg where she studied German history and civilization.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Tessman of Bristol, Connecticut and plans to attend law school upon her graduation from Salve.

Mauricita Stapleton will be attending the Spring Conference sponsored by the ACRL New England Chapter and New England College Librarians at Mount Holyoke College, South Hadley, Massachusetts on March 26 and 27, 1981. Themes for the conference are continuing education for academic librarianship and academic libraries and the changing world of higher education.

Last Sunday, <u>Dr. Daniel McGregor</u> was a guest on WSAR Radio. He spoke on Special Education in the eighties. It was a four hour program. WSAR is a Fall River Radio Station.

French Faculty and Students Attend Colloquium

Three Salve faculty and two students attended the Second Annual Colloquium on French-Canadian culture. Stressing emigration to the U.S., speakers from Canadian and American universities described the economic, cultural, religious, and linguistic impact of the French Canadians on such cities as Fall River, Woonsocket, Central Falls, and Worcester. The all-day colloquium ended with folk songs in French from the Quebec-New England region.
