THE ROSSOW LECTURE

The Alumni Office, the Special Education Department and CEC (Council for Exceptional Children) are sponsoring a lecture/seminar by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Rossow on the needs of multi-handicapped children. The lecture will be held on April 6, 1981, from 1-3 p.m. in the Twombly-Burden Room of the O'Hare Academic Center.

The Rossows bring to us a special understanding of the multi-handicapped child. As co-founders of Alpha and Omega family, Carl and Rachel parent fourteen children, eleven of whom are multi-handicapped. They have been involved in all aspects of the needs of these children; educational, physical, social and psychological. They have also been instrumental in effecting legislative action which addresses the rights of the handicapped.

In order for as many students as possible to hear Carl and Rachel, the seminar will be presented in two parts, at 1:00 p.m. and 2:15 p.m. Attendance is welcome at either one or both of these sessions. Carl and Rachel will be available for informal discussion after each one.

ANNUAL COMPETITION FOR OVERSEAS STUDY

The Institute for International Education has announced that the official opening of the 1982-83 competition for grants for graduate study or research abroad in academic fields and for professional training in the creative and performing arts is scheduled for May 1, 1981. It is expected that approximately 516 awards to 50 countries will be available for the 1982-83 academic year.

Requirements:

1. Bachelor's degree or its equivalent before beginning date of grant.
2. U.S. citizen
3. Proficiency in language of host country
4. Candidates may not hold Ph.D.
5. Candidates may not have been doing research or graduate work in the grant request foreign country during the 1981-82 Academic Year.

BICYCLE SAFETY

Bicycle THEFT is a daily occurrence on every college campus, Salve Regina is no exception. Members of the community have experienced the personal loss of their only means of transportation this semester. The chances of recovery of their property is very small in most cases, if they did not have their bicycles registered with the security department or their local police department.

Newport residents are required by city code (Sec. 7-2 and 7-4) to register their bicycle with the police department. Non residents may also register their bicycle with the local police department or the campus security department. Registration not only helps to reduce theft but can also help to recover your bicycle if stolen.

When parking your bicycle, secure it with a GOOD lock and chain. The chain should be long enough to go through both wheels and the frame. Never leave your bicycle unlocked and unattended, even for a second. When riding your bicycle in the City of Newport, never ride on the sidewalk. If your bicycle is stolen, report it immediately.

FIRE ALARM PROCEDURES

1. Familiarize yourself with the building you are in.
2. Know where all available means of egress are located. (Exits are marked with lighted signs)
3. Know where fire alarm pull stations are located.
4. Exit the building in a quiet and orderly manner.
5. DON'T PANIC
6. Move away at least 100 feet from the building, assemble in designated area and do not re-enter the building until instructed to do so.
