#### HONORS AND AWARDS CONVOCATION

Over 1200 people, including Rhode Island Governor J. Joseph Garrahy, are expected to attend Salve's Honors Convocation Saturday May 2, on the Ochre Court Terrace.

The annual event is held to recognize and honor Salve students who have excelled in scholarship, leadership and service. This year, over 200 students will receive awards.

Approximately 150 will receive awards from academic departments and College organizations, for outstanding scholarship, Who's Who Among Students, and Honor Society membership. College-wide service awards will be given to outstanding members of the freshman, sophomore, junior and senior classes. A special "Salve Scholarship" will be awarded to a junior.


Ninety-three seniors will be receiving honor cards, and 91 senior nursing pins will be given.

The class of '81 valedictory address will be given by summa cum laude graduate Rose Laranjo Northup of Newport, Rhode Island.

#### ALUMNI WEEKEND

The Newport College - Salve Regina celebrates the return of its first graduating class, the class of '51, during Reunion '81 this weekend May 1-3. The College was founded in 1947; this year is the 30th anniversary of the class of '51. Member of the 30-year class, Jane Murphy Farley, will receive the 1981 Outstanding Alumni Award for scholarship and service to alumni and the College at an Ochre Court Brunch Sunday, May 3.

Jane, a Providence native, attended Providence schools and earned a bachelor of arts in languages at Salve. She was president of the student body and class valedictorian. She was also recipient of a Fulbright scholarship, the first Salve student to receive the academic award. Upon graduating she studied at the University



of Toulouse and the Sorbonne in Paris, receiving a certificate of advanced studies in French from the University of Toulouse. Later, she earned teaching certification through studies at Providence College and the Rhode Island College.

The Salve alumna taught for many years at Elmhurst Academy in Providence and in North Providence public schools. Currently, she teaches part-time at Our Lady of Providence High School in Providence and volunteers to work with the elderly in the community. She is married and has four children.

Jane is being honored for her "longstanding service to the Salve community, beginning over 30 years ago." She is also called "one of the tradition-makers." The award notes her role in "establishing the Salve tradition of excellence in education and excellence in service to others."

Salve alumni from the classes of 1956, 1961, 1966, 1971 and 1976 will also be on campus this weekend. Events include campus tours, class reunion parties, an arts festival and a dinner/dance in Ochre Court on Saturday, May 2. The 1981 Outstanding Alumni Award will be presented Sunday, May 3 at 12 noon during a brunch in Ochre Court.

## SPRING FESTIVAL OF VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS

The College and civic communities are invited to the first indoor-outdoor spring festival of the visual and performing arts at The Newport College - Salve Regina on Saturday, May 2 at Mercy Hall/Lawn.

Festivities begin at 12 noon and continue until 6 p.m. On display at Mercy Hall all afternoon will be art of Salve students. Scheduled also for indoors at Mercy that afternoon are a one-act play, dance concert, music concert and cabaret. # ANNUAL COMPETITION FOR OVERSEAS STUDY

The Institute for International Education has announced that the official opening of the 1982-83 competition for grants for graduate study or research abroad in academic fields and for professional training in the creative and performing arts is scheduled for May 1, 1981. It is expected that approximately 516 awards to 50 countries will be available for the 1982-83 academic year.

Requirements:

- 1. Bachelor's Degree or its equivalent before beginning date of grant.
- 2. U.S. citizen
- 3. Proficiency in language of host country
- 4. Candidates may not hold a Ph.D.
- 5. Candidates may not have been doing research or graduate work in the grant request foreign country during the 1981-82 academic year.
