SALVE REGINA SISTERS OF MERCY NOTE 150TH ANNIVERSARY AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Sisters of Mercy, members of the Mercy Higher Education Colloquium, noted the 150th anniversary year of their founding in Ireland at their Seventh Annual Conference held this year at Gwynedd-Mercy College in Pennsylvania June 5-7. The Conference explored, in a "Prayer-Work-Study Weekend," the recent encyclical of Pope John Paul II "Dives in Misericordia" (Rich in Mercy) as well as the first pastoral letter, "Catholic Higher Education," which American bishops have addressed to colleges and universities.

More than 250 Sisters represented 19 Mercy colleges and 35 other colleges and universities at the Conference. Twenty-two Sisters associated with Salve Regina College attended.

The weekend meeting discussed "The Mercy of God: The Call, The Challenge, The Commitment." The Rev. John F. O'Grady, author of "Models of Jesus," celebrated the liturgy on Saturday. Father O'Grady, Associate Professor of New Testament at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, N.Y., was also the homilist. He holds a Doctorate in Sacred Theology from the University of St. Thomas in Rome and a Doctorate in Sacred Scripture from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. He is author of two other books, Jesus, Lord and Christ, and Christian Anthropology, and has published articles in various theological publications.

Keynote speakers were Sister Isabelle Keiss, Ph.D., Gwynedd-Mercy College President, who discussed the bishops' pastoral letter, and Sister Mary Ann Getty, S.T.D., Assistant Professor of Theology at Carlow College, who discussed the encyclical, "Dives in Misericordia."

Sister Sheila Megley, Vice President/Academic Dean, is Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mercy Higher Education Colloquium.

FULBRIGHT TEACHER EXCHANGE

Opportunities to teach abroad and to attend seminars abroad are available under the Fulbright Teacher Exchange program of the U.S. Department of Education for the 1982-83 year.

Elementary and secondary school teachers, college instructors and assistant professors are eligible to participate in the academic year abroad teacher exchange program. Exchanges are currently conducted with the United Kingdom, Germany, France, Switzerland, Denmark, Canada, and New Zealand. Basic requirements are: U.S. citizenship, a bachelor's degree, and three years of teaching experience for one-year positions. As most of the positions are on an interchange basis, applicants must be employed currently.

Seminars will also be held in 1982. Those eligible to apply include teachers of the classics, German, Italian, and world, Asian or Middle Eastern history and area studies, social studies supervisors, curriculum directors, teacher educators, and school administrators responsible for curriculum development. Basic requirements are: U.S. citizenship, a bachelor's degree, and two years of teaching experience.

Applications are due between September 1 and November 1, 1981. All programs are subject, of course, to the availability of Congressional appropriations.
