FACULTY NEWS

Sister Patricia Combies has been accepted into doctoral programs at both Carnegie - Mellon University and the University of Pittsburgh. She was offered a full Fellowship at the University of Pittsburgh. Sister will attend Carnegie - Mellon where she has received \$10,000 in grants and a teaching fellowship. The program will lead to a Ph.D. in Rhetoric.

Sister M. Josepha Haskins has been awarded \$1,000.00 to support her work with the elderly, sick, poor in the Appalachian region of North Carolina. This money is contributed by the Mercy Action Foundation in Mercy Center, Washington. This money will be added to an earlier grant issued by Glenmary Home Missions. These funds will enable Sister Josepha to perform household repairs, provide supplies for repairs, and bring needed food supplies to the elderly, sick, and poor in the mountains of North Carolina. This will be the seventh year Sister Josepha has undertaken this project.

Dr. Jack Childs presented a workshop on body approaches to meditation as a means to self-realization on May 7 and 8 at the Eastern Regional Network of the Association for Humanistic Psychology in Philadelphia. Three-thousand persons were in attendance at the Conference.

Dr. Mary Louise Greeley has received a "Certificate of Appreciation" from the State of Rhode Island in recognition of her work with the Commission on Volunteerism in their "Student Experiential Learning Program," an internship program designed for students who want to work in state agencies. Sister Mary Smith, College Archivist, will attend the Annual Meeting of the New England Archivists at the G.W. Clunt White Library, Mystic, Conn. on May 15, 1982. The themes for the six sessions are: Documenting the Transformation of American Business, Information Systems which involve a need for a national system of networks and information exchange, Modern Political Papers, and Deaccessioning Collections.

Sister Theresa McQueeney of the French Dept. recently attended a U.R.I. panel, "The High Schools Speak Out" -- reactions to college foreign language requirements.

Oral competency was the topic of a full day workshop attended by Sisters Marie Janelle and Eugena Poulin on May 8 at U.R.I. Sponsored by the Committee on International Studies and Foreign Languages, the program drew approximately 50 participants. Barbara Freed from the University of Pennsylvania was the guest speaker.

On Thursday, May 6, 1982, the faculty of the Psychology Dept. and approximately twelve students met for dinner at LaForge Casino. In addition to Drs. Walsh, Frankel, Bascuas and Salvatore, students who attended were Psychology majors who had taken an active interest in the Psychology Club. The dinner was planned as a "farewell" and tribute to graduating Psychology majors from the faculty of the Department and the sophomore and junior Psychology Club majors.

On May 1, Mrs. Katharine Ostrander, Social Work, attended a regional conference for women social workers at Columbia University.

On May 6, Stephanie Muri, Marge Kreiger and Katy Ostrander, of the Social Work Program, and eight junior and senior Social Work students, attended the Annual Symposium of the Rhode Island Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers which was held at the Hotel Viking. Katy is on the planning committee for a regional conference of New England Women Social Workers to be held in Salem, Mass., on June 11, entitled: "Political Action in 1982."

Another important theme in the social service arena of 1982 is volunteerism. Katy arranged a workshop on "The Care and Feeding of Volunteers" which was presented by VIA, Volunteers in Action, on May 7 at the Bellevue/Newport Health Center. The management of volunteer programs is a serious study in which it is now possible to get a college degree!
