#### ATTENTION VOTERS

A freeze on the development and production of nuclear weapons would be an asset to world peace if the freeze were bilateral between the United States and the Soviet Union. Mr. Galbraith says, "military expenditures...is at the expense of very great civilian needs." In his talk at Brown University last week, he said that a nuclear arms freeze would help the United States rebuild its civilian industry. "Arms expenditure...is deeply adverse to economic performance in the older industrial countries and notably in the United States and the Soviet Union." Rhode Island voters should campaign re: this issue which is on the ballot for November 2.

The Department for Children and Their Families needs your support so they can help abused, neglected, and homeless children. Your part in this project is simple, but crucial.

On November 2, vote "yes" on referendum #3, and you will help to make over 3 million dollars available to the DCF. They will use half of the money to develop in-state residential programs for homeless girls. Another major portion will be given to in-state residential group homes to up-

grade living, safety, and housing standards. Approximately .3 million dollars will be used for general repairs as well as the improvement of lighting and heating systems.

The DCF is the newest department in the state (established in January 1980), but it has already helped hundreds of children and teenagers. It will continue to do so with your interest and support and with the funds from the 1983 bond referendum.
