SALVE REGINA COLLEGE DANCE MARATHON  
RAISES MORE THAN \$9,000 FOR THE  
AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION

Salve students raised more than \$9,065 for the Rhode Island affiliate of the American Heart Association during the second annual dance marathon in November.

One-hundred-twenty students entered the "Dance for Heart" marathon, sponsored by the Student Life Senate and the Office of College Activities. Of these students, 112 completed the 20-hour event. Dozens of area businesses contributed money, food, beverages, T-shirts, gift certificates and dinners for the event.

Winners of the first-place prize, a seven-day trip to Orlando, Florida, were Nina Speropolous, a junior from Lynn, Mass., and Carolyn Burrows, a sophomore from North Attleboro, Mass. The pair's pledge returns totaled more than \$1,400. Second-place winner was Alan Marsilio, a Coast Guard Academy cadet from New London, Conn., who collected \$984. Marsilio won a \$150 gift certificate to the store of his choice. Paula Caissie, a freshman from Waltham, Mass., won the third-place prize of a 10-speed bike for raising \$611. The Heart Association donated each of these prizes.

PROVIDENCE OPERA THEATRE WILL  
PRESENT A CONCERT/LECTURE

The themes of the opera TOSCA will be discussed at the Concert/Lecture series to be offered at Salve on Wednesday, February 16, 1983, 7:30 p.m. in Ochre Court. In this program series, opera will be used as a point of departure to discuss the social, historical, political, and

literary circumstances surrounding both the writing and subject matter of the libretto and score of TOSCA which the Providence Opera Theatre is offering this spring.

Professor Nancy Harlow of the Roger Williams Humanities Division will discuss images and ideas that TOSCA conveys about women, their social roles, and especially the way they function as icons within the imaginations of the male characters.

Professor Kenneth Lewalski of the Rhode Island College History department will examine Revolution and Napoleonic ideology, and the problems which arise from the betrayal of the ideals of the Revolution.

Professor Edward Markward of Rhode Island College Music department and Assistant Conductor/Chorus Master of the Providence Opera Theatre will serve as commentator, giving a short synopsis of the opera and leading the musical segment. Four vocalists will portray principal roles from the opera, TOSCA, by Puccini.

This series is funded by a grant from the Rhode Island Committee for the Humanities, an affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.
