SALVE REGINA COLLEGE ANNOUNCES
ITS COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER AND
RECIPIENTS OF HONORARY DEGREES

The speaker for Salve Regina College's fourteenth annual Commencement, to be held on the Terrace of Ochre Court, June 1 at 3:00 p. m., will be Dr. William Conley, President of Sacred Heart University, Bridgeport, Connecticut, it was announced today by Sister Mary Hilda, President of Salve Regina.

Dr. Conley is one of only a half dozen laymen heading Catholic colleges in the United States. He has had a distinguished career as a teacher and administrator in both public and private education at the secondary and collegiate levels. Prior to assuming his present position last year, when Sacred Heart University was founded, he had been the Director of the National Study of Catholic Education at the University of Notre Dame.

Sister Mary Hilda, R.S.M., also announced that honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws would be granted this year to the Very Reverend Vincent C. Dore, O.P., President of Providence College, and Dr. John Francis Quinn, Vice President of Student Affairs at the University of Rhode Island.
