Sister Mary Smith, Archivist, has been invited by the Newport Preservation Society to attend their day long symposium. The meeting will include renowned artists and sculpturers, painters, and wood workers and carvers who will discuss Chinese Art. The Symposium is to be related principally to the lovely Chinese Tea House on the grounds of Marble House.

The Art Association is hosting this session, in early June.

Sister Eugena Poulin was recently the guest speaker at Bishop Hendricken High School's French Honors Night. The

topic was a Tribute to Rochambeau.

Dr. Jack Childs will coordinate the Newport Body Awareness & Sports Clinic June 20 to July 29. Founded by Harry Horgan and sponsored by Shake-a-Leg, Inc. the Clinic gives paralyzed persons the opportunity through holistic approaches to take charge of their own lives and to explore the possibilities for movement.

Dr. Childs is also doing a residential workshop on Meditation with Poldi Orlando, internationally known movement specialist and Gestalt therapist at the Stone House Club, Little Compton on the weekend of May 20.

Dr. Childs recently did a training workshop for professionals at the Newport Training Institute in holistic approaches to psychotherapy.

AUTHORS, POETS, PSYCHOLOGISTS EXAMINE NUCLEAR WAR THREAT AT SALVE REGINA - THE NEWPORT COLLEGE

"Facing Apocalypse," an international conference on nuclear war as seen from the perspectives of psychoanalysis and the humanities, will be held at Salve Regina College, on June 10-12, 1983.

Among the internationally known speakers are Dr. Norman O. Brown, Denise Levertov and Robert Jay Lifton. Dr. Brown, author of "Life Against Death: The Psychoanalytic Meaning of History," is professor of humanities at Cowell College, University of California at Santa Cruz.

Denise Levertov is a professor of poetry and teaches at several universities across the U.S.

Dr. Robert Jay Lifton is a professor of psychiatry at Yale University School of Medicine.

Robert Bosnak, Jungian analyst and conference organizer, summed up his thoughts on "Facing Apocalypse" by saying, "With our newly acquired capabilities of the total destruction of all life on earth, we have moved into a different area of human imagination. We are no longer only dealing with fantasies of destruction, but we are also involved with our most elevated passion: reaching beyond the temporal. For the first time ever, mankind can bring about apocalypse -- the revelation of the end of time. The pressure to act out these compelling fantasies is more volatile than ever."

THE A.I.F.S. TO HOST SPANISH STUDENTS

The American Institute for Foreign Study is recruiting Aquidneck Island families to host high school students from Spain for one month this summer.

The students, aged 12 to 17, will be here July 6 through August 3, and will attend classes weekday mornings.

Families, including single parents, with children living at home, may apply for the program by contacting Dianne E. Harrington, A.I.F.S. A room may be shared by the Spanish student and a host family child or teenager of the same sex.

The family's most important contribution to the student will be English conversation and American culture. In turn, host families may participate in A.I.F.S. summer trips and tours with their guests, receive overseas scholarships, and benefit from the cultural and language exchanges.
