IN COLD WAR STRATEGY STUDY**

A study of how the United States can win the Cold War without nuclear war has been made by the civilian National Strategy Committee of The American Security Council and released today under the title Guidelines For Cold War Victory. (Copy of report, a summary, and a press release from The American Security Council are attached).

In addition to the 28-member National Strategy Committee, 102 cooperating organizations representing a wide range of interests, and 128 colleges and universities participated in the study. Salve Regina College was one of the 25 Catholic colleges and universities represented in the educational sector.

The final content of the study is the sole responsibility of the Committee, and with such a large cooperating body it is to be expected that all those cooperating are not necessarily in agreement with the specific recommendations.

Professors in two major universities and one college, however, have already informed The American Security Council that they will use Guidelines as a text beginning this fall.
