Sister Kathleen Healy, Visiting Professor of English, recently had two books issued in paperback editions. Frances Warde: American Founder of the Sisters of Mercy was published in paperback in 1983 by Seabury Press, New York City. The Demon and the Dove, a study of literature and existential psychology of which Sister Kathleen is co-author, was issued in paperback by the University Press of America in 1983.

During the current academic year, Sister Kathleen is working on a book titled, Eastern Ways of Prayer for Western Christians. It is an indirect growth of fourteen months she spent in India (1976-1977) as a Fulbright Professor at the University of Madras, South India. Sister returned to India for twelve months in 1980 to do research on relationships between Hinduism and Christianity. Her present writing concerns sadhanas or "ways to God" through prayer. Sister expects to finish the first draft of this book in June, 1984.

Dr. Anthony A. Walsh, Chairman of the Psychology Department, has recently published two articles in the journal History of Psychology. Both articles were written at the invitation of the Editor, Dr. Wolfgang Bringmann of the University of South Alabama. One article is a memorial biography of the neuroanatomist Johann Christoph Spurzheim (1776-1832). Dr. Walsh is also the author of this individual's biography in the multivolume Dictionary of Scientific Biography. The second article entitled, "Phrenology Applied: The Trial and Conviction of Major Mitchell," discusses the events leading up to and surrounding the trial of a nine-year-old boy in 1834. The trial is of historical importance since it was the first in the annals of American jurisprudential history that psychiatric testimony -- actually phrenological -- was introduced in an attempt to free the defendant of criminal responsibility due to mental defect and disease.
