Seventy-two Salve Regina College

students arrived on the college campus yesterday, Labor Day, September 7, 10 days ahead of their classmates. These seniors are reporting early in time to begin assignments as student teachers in the Newport School system for the fall semester.

The students will cover every grade level and school in Newport County, 58 of them at the elementary and 14 at the secondary level. They will attend a special meeting on Tuesday, September 8, at Rogers High School, when they will be addressed by the new Superintendent of Schools, Joseph Devine. Mrs. Eleanor McMahon, college supervisor of student teachers in elementary schools, and Mr. George McKim, college supervisor of student teachers in secondary schools, will also attend in addition to principals and supervising teachers from the Newport schools.

Salve Regina's teacher training program will allow its students to work with Newport youngsters ranging from the educable retarded to the intellectually gifted. Twelve of the Salve Regina students will work with gifted pupils in grades IV and V at Cranston Calvert School, concentrating on special areas: English, mathematics and reading. At least 6 students will spend their training period dealing with the special problems presented by educable retarded children at Underwood School in preparation for certification in special education.

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
