Salve Regina is pleased to announce the third of this year's cultural encounters, known collectively as the Atwood Lecture Series. The series is sponsored by the Philosophy Department. The weekend workshop is scheduled for Saturday, April 14 at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday, April 15 at 2:00 p.m. in O'Hare Academic Center.

The topics of the third encounter are "Anti-Semitism: An Unending Tragedy" and "The Holocaust and the Christian Conscience." Reverend Edward H. Flannery is the distinguished guest speaker.

In two presentations, Father Flannery confronts the problem that anti-semitism and the Holocaust pose for the Christian conscience. He lays a heavy responsibility on the churches for their role in the development of anti-semitism, and invites them to take a leading role in its defeat and in the prevention of future holocausts.

There will be a panel of reactors as part of the weekend workshop. Dale G. Blumen, President of Temple Shalom; Reverend Doctor Richard Brown, President, Rhode Island Council of Churches; Dr. James Hersh, Professor of Philosophy at Salve and Kathy Shatraw, student, class of 1984, are the panelists. Reverend Eugene Hillman, Director of Liberal Arts Graduate Program at Salve, will serve as moderator. Sister Lucille will give the introductory speech on Saturday evening.
