Salve will be holding its thirty-fourth Commencement exercises Sunday, June 3, at 2:00 p.m. on the east lawn of O'Hare Academic Center. Five-hundred-three students will receive degrees.

Mr. Jeremiah C. Lynch, Jr., attorney at law at Moore Virgadamo and Lynch, Ltd. and past Chairman of Salve's Board of Trustees, will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Salve.

Sister Lucille McKillop will deliver the address to this year's graduating class and Sister M. Therese Antone will induct the '84 graduates into the College's Alumni Association.

Wendy Ashcroft, a nursing major from North Dighton, Mass., is this year's valedictorian. Wendy will graduate summa cum laude (highest honors). In all, 101 students will graduate with honors, including five summa cum laude, 34 magna cum laude and 62 cum laude.

One-hundred-eighty-seven students will receive master's degrees, 305 will receive baccalaureate degrees and 11 will be awarded associate degrees.

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Attention all students interested in Latin! Latin 101 will be offered in Fall 1984. The introductory course is designed for students with either no previous background in classical Latin or with only a limited background.

Clifton, a junior majoring in Criminal Justice, was co-captain of the men's basketball team and second baseman for the men's baseball team which won ten games, Salve's highest season total.

Sportsmanship Awards went to seniors Elaine Cummings and William Graziano. This award is given to senior varsity athletes who have been selected by the coaches as representing the values of the College: respect and deportment in athletic competition. Elaine was captain of the women's soccer team and William, a relief pitcher on the men's baseball team, was prize state champion in the long jump and high

The Forum is an annual study session to promote the exchange of ideas between the officers appointed to the Naval War College and selected civilian and military guests. This year's general theme is: "The Navy and Marine Corps in Deterrence and Crisis." Father Hillman's participation is a result of his graduate course in social ethics which he taught during the 1983-1984 academic year.

In addition to his extensive research of Japanese history, geography, art and economics, he has also been learning the Japanese language. Mr. Marinosci has been assisted in his efforts by Kumiko Hosaka, a graduate student in Human Development at Salve who is a native of Fuji-Yoshida, Japan.

Partial funding of this photographic project comes from the Afga-Gevaert Film Company and the Honda Motor Corporation. In addition, Mr. Marinosci has also been awarded a Faculty Development Grant from Salve.
