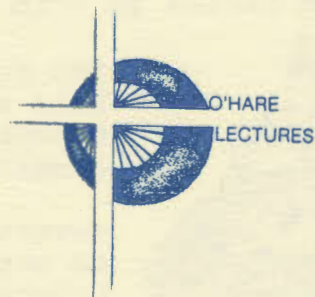
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## O'HARE LECTURE SERIES

The Kids in Safety Seats Program (K.I.S.S.) holds training sessions each Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10:45 - 11:45 a.m. at Newport Hospital. Seats are then made available at a minimal rental fee for those parents and grandparents that have completed the training session.
