Over 40 foreign and American mathematicians and educators will present papers and participate in panel discussions. Several conference sessions will be devoted to computer-assisted instruction developed in the United States and abroad. Delegations will be present from Bulgaria, Canada, France, West Germany, Great Britain, Hungary, Israel, Italy, Japan, Mexico, The Netherlands, Poland and Sweden.

The plan is to publish two volumes of papers soon after the conference and make them available throughout the United States and around the world.
