Newport Irish Heritage Month will be celebrated with special events throughout the month of March. Highlighting the festivities will be "An Irish Festival" presented by Salve Regina on Saturday, March 9.

The two-hour performance, to be staged at the Rogers High School Auditorium in Newport, will include music, dance and narration related to Irish culture.

Offering the musical interpretations will be the combined groups and choruses of Salve Regina, totaling 90 voices. The Chamber Chorus, Madrigal Singers, College Chorus, Concert Choir and Women's Chorus will also perform as individual groups. Selections include the national anthem of Ireland, "Shule Agra," "The Last Rose of Summer" and "Kelly, The Boy From Killane."

Oratorio singer Donald St. Jean, an instructor at Salve, will sing "Danny Boy" as a featured soloist.

The Salve choruses are under the direction of Brother James Loxham who described the concert's flavor, "Everything we are presenting is as authentically Irish as possible. There will be ancient songs, contemporary songs, folksongs and songs of war and oppression. We will portray the history of Ireland as well as what

Ireland represents today."

Sister Lucille McKillop, President of the College, will thread commentary throughout the evening to enrich and enlighten the audience about the folklore and tradition of Irish heritage as it relates to the performances on stage.

The 15-piece Salve band will provide musical accompaniment. Anita Renfro, accomplished pianist and Salve instructor, and harpist Anne-Marguerite Michaud, a member of the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra, will also accompany the groups.

The Derry Irish Dancers, directed by Kathleen Hanley, will lend gaiety to the evening as they step through reels, jigs and hornpipes. Musical accompaniment for the seven costumed dancers will be provided by Sheila Falls who was named world champion of Irish fiddle music for 1984.

"ZEN SESSION WITH KOREAN ZEN MASTER SEUNG SAHN"

A traditional question and answer dialogue with Zen Master Seung Sahn will be held on Tuesday, March 12 from 2:00-3:15 p.m. in the lower T.B. room of O'Hare.

Ven. Seung Sahn is the first Korean Zen Master to teach in the West. After five years in the army, he served as chairman of the committee to reform the Chogyo order of Korean Buddhism and was abbot of five temples in Seoul. He spent nine years teaching in Japan, founding temples in Tokyo and Hong Kong. The Zen Master came to America in 1972 and is presently the director of Zen communities in Providence, Cambridge, New Haven, New York and Los Angeles.

Dr. McKenna serves as Chairman of the NEBHE.
