An educator since 1965, she has taught Health, Family Life and Human Sexuality at the college level for 12 years and has conducted her "Life" programs throughout the United States for children, parents, educators, college and general audiences since 1976. Mrs. Rosenberg has been featured in newspapers, radio and television programs throughout Canada and the United States.

Salve Regina's O'Hare Lecture Series will present, "The Spiritual Crisis of Modern Culture: New Energies for Renewal," by Catholic theologian Joe Holland on Thursday, April 25 at 7:00 p.m. in the O'Hare Auditorium.

Mr. Holland specializes in the dialogue between theology and social theory. His recent work has focused on the emergence of a post-modern culture. He has pursued the religious implications of this culture for Catholic theology, pastoral strategy, and spirituality, as well as its social implications for the areas of work, labor unions, family and health.

Author of "The American Journey" and co-author of the "Social Analysis: Linking Faith and Justice," Mr. Holland has been an associate of the Center for Concern in Washington, D.C. since 1973.
