SALVE REGINA TO HOLD THIRTY-FIFTH COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES PRECEDED BY MAGISTERIAL, BACCALAUREATE CEREMONIES

Salve Regina will hold its thirty-fifth commencement exercises Sunday, May 19 at 10:00 a.m. on the east lawn of the O'Hare Academic Center. It will mark the largest graduation in the College's history. Six hundred and eight degrees will be conferred under a tent nearly 23,000 square feet in size.

Sister Lucille McKillop, President of Salve Regina, will address this year's graduating class with the Commencement Message and Sister M. Therese Antone, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, will induct the '85 graduates into the College's Alumni Association. The Most Reverend Kenneth A. Angell, Auxiliary Bishop of Providence, will give the benediction. Scheduled to attend are Rhode Island Governor Edward D. DiPrete, Congresswoman Claudine Schneider and Newport Mayor Patrick Kirby.

Rosa Campos, an accounting major from Fall River, Mass., is this year's valedictorian. Rosa will graduate summa cum laude. In all, 105 students will graduate with honors, including ten summa cum laude, 27 magna cum laude and 68 cum laude. Two hundred and forty~nine students will receive master's degrees, 346 will receive baccalaureate

degrees and thirteen will be awarded associate degrees.

A 700-year-old tradition, in which graduating students are presented academic hoods in a solemn, religious ceremony, is being continued by Salve Regina at the Magisterial Hooding Service and the Baccalaureate Mass. Hoods are conferred in a symbolic gesture that dates back to the 12th and 13th centuries when universities were primarily under the jurisdiction of the Church. At that time, the educated were monks or priests who wore habits to which were attached cowls or hoods. Today, the hood has come to symbolize academic achievement.

The Magisterial Hooding Service will be held on Wednesday, May 15 at 7:00 p.m. at St. Joseph's Church in Newport. Salve faculty member Reverend Eugene Hillman will deliver the address.

The Baccalaureate Mass will be celebrated at St. Mary's Church in Newport on Saturday, May 18 at 2:00 p.m. Salve Chaplain, Father Raymond McNicholas will be the celebrant.

At the Magisterial Service and Baccalaureate Mass, gold trimmed hoods will be presented to those receiving a bachelor or master of science degree with white trimmed hoods conferred on students graduating with a bachelor or master of art degree. The College colors of blue . and white line each of the black hoods.

SALVE REGINA STUDENT CHOSEN TO COMPETE IN VANDERSTAR CHALLENGE REGATTA

<u>Gregory</u> <u>Hunter</u>, a sophomore majoring in psychology at Salve Regina, was selected to represent Salve's Sailing Club in the Vanderstar Challenge Regatta held in Annapolis, Maryland on May 11 and 12.

The National Regatta was sailed on the Chesapeake Bay in Mistral Bermuda Class Sailboards provided by the United States Naval Academy. The regatta format was sixty percent modified olympic, thirty percent slalom and ten percent long distance, two-hour race. The top two finishers in the race qualified for the United States Yacht Racing Union's 1985 Board Sailing Championship. Trophies were awarded to the first through fifth place finishers among the sixteen individual competitors.

Among the twelve competing institutions were Tulane University, United States Naval Academy, University of Florida, Texas A & M, Dartmouth College, Georgia Tech and the United States Coast Guard Academy.

The Vanderstar Challenge Regatta is organized by the U.S. Naval Academy Sailing Squadron. The race is governed by the International Yacht Racing Rules, United States Yacht Racing Union, The Intercollegiate Yacht Racing Association's Official Procedural Rules for
