## SALVE REGINA TO HOLD NINTH ANNUAL GOVERNOR'S BALL

The Ninth Annual Salve Regina College Governor's Ball will usher in the holiday season on Saturday, December 7. The Ball, one of the earlier Christmas season galas in the state, will take place in the elegance of Ochre Court from 9:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m.

Joining Sister Lucille McKillop in hosting the event are Governor and Mrs. Edward D. DiPrete. This year's Ball marks Governor DiPrete's first in that capacity. The black-tie affair attracts friends and supporters of the College as well as members of the College community. The annual fundraising event helps to supplement the scholarship program for Salve students. General chairmen for the event are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Skala of North Providence.

The decor of Ochre Court will reflect a Victorian theme. Included in the festive ambiance will be lighted, tree-shaped centerpieces of boxwood. Primary to the decorations are gold and white ribbons and the thematic use of cherubs. December greens, such as balsam and pine, will adorn the nineteenth century mansion's arches, bannisters and sconces.

Students from Sigma Phi Sigma, the College's honor society, will serve as hosts and hostesses at the \$200-per-couple ball. Valet parking will be provided. Guests will be greeted upon their arrival with traditional caroling presented by small groups throughout Ochre Court from the Salve Regina College Choruses under the direction of Brother James Loxham.

SALVE REGINA'S ANNUAL DANCE MARATHON  
TO BENEFIT JOSLIN DIABETES CENTER



Salve Regina's Student Life Senate will sponsor the Fifth Annual Dance Marathon to be held in Ochre Court on Friday, November 15 at 7:00 p.m. through 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, November 16. Proceeds from this year's marathon will benefit the diabetes research, treatment, and educational programs at Boston's Joslin Diabetes Center.

For those persons unable to dance, a "Rockathon" will be held in conjunction with the Dance Marathon. A maximum of sixty couples are registered to dance throughout the 20 hour period while "Rockathon" participants rock the hours away in rocking chairs. Providing musical entertainment for the participants and spectators will be RI-104 FM. Prizes, including gift certificates and merchandise from local businesses, will be awarded to participants.

Members of the Student Life Senate at Salve inaugurated the marathon in 1981 as an event to bring together the student body to help charity. Throughout the five years a non-profit, charitable organization has been chosen by the students as the recipient for all the funds raised.

Spectators are invited to stop in at any time during the two-day event. A donation will be requested at the door. The Joslin Diabetes Center, established in the 1890s, is an international leader in treating diabetes and related disorders, conducting laboratory and clinical research, and providing education to patients and health care professionals.

### SALVE REGINA COLLEGE AND THE NEWPORT INSTITUTE TO HOLD CONFERENCE ON MULTINATIONAL CORPORATIONS

Salve Regina College's Trimester Graduate Program in cooperation with The Newport Institute have organized a conference, "Multinational Corporations: Are They Harmful or Beneficial to U.S. Interests?", to be held Saturday, November 16 in the O'Hare Auditorium.

A major concern of informed American citizens centers on the role of multinational corporations. These corporations have been accused of total social immorality and unpatriotic behavior. They have been charged with robbing Americans of jobs, inciting revolutions, trading with the "enemy" and consistently putting their own interests above the national good. The opposite view is that multinational corporations have brought political stability and economic welfare to many areas by knitting together disparate peoples into a world-embracing economic force.

The one-day conference will provide the opportunity for concerned citizens to explore these opposing views. Speakers will include Martin J. Gerra, Manager of International Economics for IBM, Ian Colville Kinniburgh, a Transnational Corporations Affairs Officer for the United Nations, and David R. Malpass, a Senior Analyst for Taxes and Trade of the U.S. Senate Budget Committee. Dr. Robert Jordan, Distinguished Visiting Professor of Strategy at the Naval War College, will serve as the conference chair.

The program, designed to include audience participation, will begin with coffee and registration at 9:00 a.m. and conclude promptly at 4:00 p.m. The advanced registration fee of \$25 per person or \$40 per couple will cover coffee and lunch. Registration at the door will be \$30 per person.
