NINTH ANNUAL SALVE REGINA COLLEGE GOVERNOR'S BALL RAISES \$60,000

Ochre Court was the site of the ninth annual Salve Regina College Governor's Ball held on Saturday, December 7. Over 400 guests were in attendance at the lavish black-tie affair.

December greens, such as laurel, balsam and pine, decorated the nineteenth century mansion's arches, bannisters and sconces, reflecting this year's Victorian theme. Centerpieces of boxwood, decorated with gold ribbons, miniature lights, and white porcelain cherub ornaments, adorned each table at the Ball. The centerpieces and ornaments were given to the guests at evening's end as mementos.

The \$60,000 raised was the most in the event's nine year history. The donations from the Ball supplement Salve's scholarship monies which are awarded to deserving students.
