CHRISTOPHER KIERNAN NAMED ACADEMIC DEAN



President Sister Lucille McKillop has named Christopher M. Kiernan as Academic Dean.

Mr. Kiernan, currently the Vice President/Students, has been serving as the Acting Academic Dean at Salve Regina since the beginning of the 1985-86 academic year. He will retain the title of Vice President while adding that of Academic Dean.

Mr. Kiernan joined Salve Regina College as Assistant to the President and Dean of Admissions in 1980. His responsibilities included the development of a comprehensive admissions plan which focused on all aspects and strategies of recruitment, student selection and the distribution of financial aid. He worked in that capacity until 1982. With the College's enrollment objectives achieved, he was then named Vice President/Students. Since that time he has worked with Dr. Sheila Megley, R.S.M., Salve Provost and Academic Vice President, to ensure the integration of all academic and student services. Sister Sheila Megley will retain the position of Provost, responsible for all institutional planning.

In accepting his new position, Vice President Kiernan stated, "I am quite pleased to have the opportunity to continue the work already undertaken by the past and present faculty and administrators of Salve Regina to develop a comprehensive curriculum befitting one of the best colleges in the nation."

A graduate of Assumption College in Worcester, Massachusetts, Mr. Kiernan also received his Master of Arts there in 1970. He is a doctoral degree candidate at Boston College. Mr. Kiernan resides in Newport with his wife, Margaret, and daughters, Kathleen, Coleen, Marlene and Christine.


IRISH FOLK TRIO TO PERFORM

"SOVIET IDEOLOGY TODAY"



Salve Regina's O'Hare Lecture Series will present Dr. Paul Holman speaking on "Soviet Ideology Today" on Wednesday, January 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the O'Hare Auditorium. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Dr. Holman, an authority on the Soviet Union, will present a dramatic explanation of how the Russians view themselves and the rest of the world. Dr. Holman is a professional historian who has devoted his entire career to Soviet studies.

To add greater realism and impact to the lecture, he will wear the uniform of a Soviet officer and will address the audience as if he were a dedicated Communist. Dr. Holman will then change his role and analyze the Soviet Union from the perspective of an American historian.

Dr. Holman is currently Professor of Defense Economics and Decision Making at the Naval War College and an Adjunct Professor in the Economics Department at Salve Regina. He holds a Ph.D. in Russian History from Georgetown University and graduated in 1984 from the College of Naval Warfare with Highest Distinction. He lectures extensively here and abroad.

During the winter break Father Eugene Hillman of the graduate faculty of Salve Regina went to Germany as a guest of West German Radio in Cologne. He was there as a consultant for a program dealing in depth with the origin, meaning and significance of Liberation Theology. As part of the program he was interviewed with particular reference to the emergence of Liberation Theology in Africa.

A new two-volume work by Deane William Ferm, Third World Liberation Theologies (Orbis Books), contains selections from Father Hillman's writings, and lists him as one of the eight liberation theologians of Africa; he is the only white among them. Nine liberation theologians are listed for Asia, and ten for Latin America.

Dr. Caroline Salvatore, Associate Professor of Psychology, will present her paper, "National Stereotypes and Their Relation to Self-Perceptions in Irish, Italian, and American College Students," to the 57th annual meeting of the Eastern Psychological Association to be held in April, 1986 in New York City.

Dr. Salvatore is also a sponsor of a paper to be presented by Mrs. Virginia Clappi before the Eastern Psychological Association's annual convention to be held in New York City April 17-20. Virginia Clappi graduated from Salve Regina last spring with a Master of Arts degree in Human Development. Her paper, "Children's Attitudes Toward Old People and Aging" describes research planned and carried out by Ms. Clappi as part of a course requirement when she was a student in Dr. Salvatore's graduate course on the Psychology of Aging.

Dr. Heath Twichell, Director of the Trimester Graduate Program, is the author of a chapter in The Alaska Highway: Papers of the 40th Anniversary Symposium, recently published by the University of British Columbia Press. The book is the outgrowth of an interdisciplinary symposium held at Northern Lights College of Fort St. John, British Columbia, "to reflect on the issues, personalities and effects of the construction of the Alaska Highway" during World War II. Dr. Twichell's contribution to the symposium, and to the book, was entitled "Cut, Fill and Straighten: The Role of the Public Roads Administration in the Building of the Alaska Highway". Dr. Twichell is working on a full length book concerning the Highway's role in the Second World War.

MAIR-DAVIS MUSIC FOR GUITAR AND MANDOLIN
TO BE HEARD AT NOON CONCERT

Marilynn Mair and Mark Davis bring their unique chamber music sound to Salve Regina's Noon Concert Series on Wednesday, February 5. Since 1975 the Mair-Davis Duo has performed chamber music recitals for guitar and mandolin throughout the U.S. and Europe. Their first record album, "Music for Guitar and Mandolin," has won them international praise for their skillful and sensitive performance. It was chosen as one of the "Dozen Best Recordings of 1981" by Guitar and Lute magazine. A second record of Latin American music, "Picaflor," has been released on the Titanic label and is already gathering acclaim.

The Duo recently returned from a seven-month European tour where they delighted audiences at music festivals in England, Italy, France, and Spain. The Duo performs a wide variety of chamber music including Baroque, Classical, Contemporary and Latin-American repertoire.

Their program at the Noon Concert Series will be held at Cecilia Hall in Carey Mansion. The free concerts, which are presented on the first Wednesday of each month, are open to the public.
