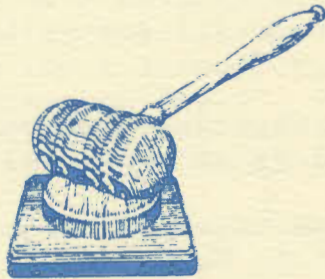

IRISH HERITAGE CONCERT

"Land of Song" is the title of this year's Irish heritage concert to be held for two performances in Ochre Court. The evenings of traditional Irish song and dance will be presented Friday, March 7 and Saturday, March 8.

The individual and combined choruses of Salve Regina will perform their interpretations of such Irish ballads as "The Snowy-Breasted Pearl", "The Kerry Dances", "The Maid of Randalstown", "The Rakes of Mallow", and "The Wren Song." A few of the concert's songs will feature soloists.

Musical accompaniment will be provided by a small Salve ensemble. Included in the instrumental back-up will be flute, violin, cello and piano. Sheila Falls, former world champion of Irish fiddle music, will also be featured.

The Irish Lace Dancers of Boston will be an additional attraction at the performance. Ranging in age from 11 to 23, the dancers will perform traditional Irish steps such as reels and jigs. They also choreograph some of their own dances including "Waterford Crystal." In March, the Irish Lace Dancers leave for Ireland and the World Championship in Irish Dancing.

Tickets for the 90 minute concert go on sale at Cecilia Hall on Monday, February 24. Tickets for the general public are \$5, \$3 for Salve faculty and staff and \$2 for Salve students. Tickets may be purchased Monday - Friday between 9:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Both performances begin at 8 p.m.
