The Art Department at Salve Regina is featuring two exhibitions in conjunction with its application for membership to the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD).

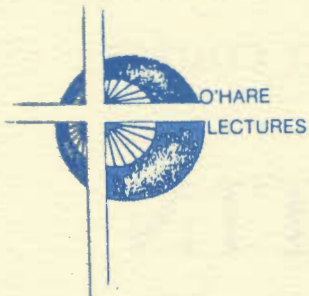

SALVE TO FEATURE WALL STREET JOURNAL REPORTER IN O'HARE LECTURE SERIES

Salve Regina's O'Hare Lecture Series will feature "Wall Street Journal" reporter Jonathan Kwitny on Tuesday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m. in the O'Hare auditorium. His topic will be "Lies: The Government, The Press and Foreign Policy."

Kwitny is based in the "Wall Street Journal's" New York bureau where he writes front-page features on numerous subjects in the U.S. and abroad. He has lived or traveled in over 90 countries and has been published in several national magazines including "Harpers," "Atlantic," "Esquire," "The New Republic," "The Nation" and "Mother Jones." Kwitny has also written five books which include, "Endless Enemies: The Making of an Unfriendly World," a 1985 runner-up for the Pulitzer Prize in general nonfiction.

SALVE'S "NOON CONCERT SERIES" TO FEATURE JAZZ PIANIST MAC CHRUPCALA

Salve Regina's "Noon Concert Series" will feature jazz pianist Mac Chrupcala on Wednesday, April 2.

Chrupcala has been a frequent guest artist for the Newport Friends of Jazz Series and has been a featured performer at the Newport Jazz Festival, the Woods Hole Music Festival, the Rehoboth Music Festival, Brown University, Berklee College of Music, Bryant College, Holy Cross College, Southeastern Massachusetts University and Brandeis University. In addition, Chrupcala has been active as a composer and lecturer and has served for the past 14 years as supervisor of music for the Newport Public Schools.

In 1982, Chrupcala released his debut album, "It's About Time," and is currently on the Rhode Island State Touring Program. He has studied with Jacki Byard as part of the Afro-American graduate program at the New England Conservatory of

SALVE RECEIVES GRANT FROM SEARS-ROEBUCK FOUNDATION

Salve Regina College has received a \$1,400 grant from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. The award is part of unrestricted grants totaling \$18,800 which are being distributed to six privately supported colleges and universities in Rhode Island.

The Rhode Island colleges and universities are among 956 private, accredited, two- and four-year institutions across the country which are sharing in \$1,750,000 in Sears Foundation funds for the 1985-86 academic year. The funds may be used as Salve Regina deems necessary.

FILM ON HOLOCAUST SURVIVORS TO PREMIERE AT SALVE

Rhode Island Filmmakers announce the premiere of a one-hour documentary film, "Here We Live Again," to be shown in Salve Regina's O'Hare Academic Center on Sunday, April 6 at 4:00 p.m. The film is a group portrait and study of the quest of Holocaust Survivors of Rhode Island to create a memorial archive.

The showing is free and open to the public and was funded by a grant from the R.I. Committee for the Humanities with additional support from the R.I. Foundation and the Jewish Federation of R.I. The film was co-directed by Peter O'Neill and Michael Fink, RISD faculty members.

A book of essays and letters will be distributed at the screening, featuring responses to the film by local professors, including transcripts from the interviews, personal photos, and current portraits of the survivors. A panel discussion will follow.

Sister M. Therese Antone, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, has been selected as a committee member on the Executive Board for Brown University's Institute for Secondary Education.

Sister Therese will join other committee members to accomplish the Institute's basic purposes. These include providing in-service programs for secondary teachers in collaboration with Brown faculty. The Institute also hopes to create a forum for teachers and school administrators within which lecture series,
