SALVE REGINA AND THE NEWPORT INSTITUTE TO PRESENT CONFERENCE ON MAINLAND CHINA'S NEW COURSE

Salve Regina College and The Newport Institute will present a conference, "Mainland China's New Course - Significance for the United States, Japan and the Soviet Union," on Saturday, April 12, 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the O'Hare Auditorium.

Four noted speakers will offer expert perspectives on the China topic. Dr. Frank Jen, M & T Bank Professor of Banking and Finance at the State University of New York at Buffalo and frequent visitor to Mainland China, will speak on China's new course and emergence as an economic force in Asia. Since 1980, Dr. Jen has been involved in a joint project of the Chinese and American governments to provide large numbers of low, middle and upper level managers and senior executives in Chinese industry with the latest in Western managerial and technological "know how."

Dr. Paul Holman, a distinguished Soviet scholar and Professor of Defense Economics and Decision Making at Newport's Naval War College, will discuss the impact of the New China on the Soviet Union.

Mr. Glenn Kumekawa, Director of the Intergovernmental Policy Analysis Program at the University of Rhode Island, will question whether Japan's interest in China will trigger a sense of déjà vu among the other major players in the Far East.

Dr. Richard Buczynski, Director and Senior Economist of Wharton Econometric Forecasting Associates in Washington, D.C. and a regular consultant to Fortune "500" multinational corporations, will address whether American business prospects in China are likely to result in feast or famine. The moderator for the conference will be Dr. Richmond Lloyd, Professor of Management and Course Coordinator for Defense Economics at the Naval War College.

The program will begin with coffee and registration at 8:30 a.m. in the O'Hare Academic Center. Faculty, staff and students of Salve Regina are invited to the conference, free of charge. A buffet lunch will be served at 12:30 p.m. in Miley Hall. Lunch tickets will cost \$4.00 each.
