## TOM CHAPIN HEADLINES SALVE REGINA WORLD HUNGER CONCERT

Salve Regina will present "Your Neighbor is Hungry," a concert to raise public awareness regarding world hunger and to benefit local charities on Friday, October 17, 8:00 p.m., at Rogers High School auditorium. Performing at the concert will be members of Salve Regina's Orpheus Society.

The featured guest performer will be Tom Chapin. Chapin, brother of the late singer/songwriter Harry Chapin, has performed numerous benefits for worthy causes with special attention paid to world hunger. It was his brother Harry who founded the non-profit organization World Hunger Year (WHY). Tom has been an active participant in WHY's ongoing efforts to continue Harry's work.

A campus-wide effort has been made at Salve Regina to organize the concert. Under the direction of the Dean of Students Office and the Office of College Activities, numerous Salve student groups have orchestrated the event's planning. Students from Salve's theatre, music, administration of justice, management and art departments have volunteered their time and skill. The College's Student Life Senate has also participated.

JONATHAN FRID OF BARNABAS COLLINS FAME  
TO OFFER WORKSHOP AND PERFORMANCE

Jonathan Frid will be performing in "Fools and Fiends," a compilation of supernatural and human tales of horror and folly, on Saturday, October 18 in Salve Regina's Megley Theatre. Best known for his role as Barnabas Collins on ABC's "Dark Shadows," Frid will also offer a one-day workshop on Sunday, October 19 beginning at 1:00 p.m.

In the production of "Fools and Fiends" Frid uses only a stool and podium for his presentation. He vocally dramatizes his collection of prose and poetry creating his own commentaries to lead into each selection.

Frid will open Sunday's workshop with a discussion on how he developed as an actor playing a succession of "heavies," beginning at the age of 16. He will talk about the development of his one-man show as well as his criteria for choosing material.

Also speaking at the workshop will be Mary O'Leary, assistant to the producer of the daytime soap, "Guiding Light." She will focus on what goes on behind the camera of a production.

There will be no reservations for the workshop. Seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. Tickets for "Fools and Fiends" are \$5.00 and may be purchased at the Mercy Hall Theatre Box Office, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Curtain is at 8:00 p.m.
