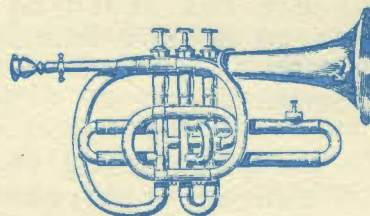

The McKillop Gallery at Salve Regina is currently featuring the "Rhode Island Clay Invitational" which will run through October 30. Five artists who live/and or work in Rhode Island were invited on the basis of their diverse approaches to the clay medium. Belinda Gabryl, part-time instructor of art at Salve Regina, is participating in the exhibition. In a review by John Pantalone, editor of NEWPORT THIS WEEK, he notes, "The most enjoyable pieces in the show are Gabryl's quirky little vessels from her 'Tornado' series and her stylized 'bas relief' tableaus. In each case she builds sprightliness into the slickly glazed pieces with an urgency of expression."

An upcoming exhibition at the McKillop Gallery will feature the artistic group "Nineteen Rhode Island Artists on Paper." The group was formed in order to show and market their diverse works on paper through exhibitions and portfolio presentations. Their exhibition at the McKillop Gallery will run from November 6 through December 11. An opening reception will be held in the gallery on Thursday, November 6 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.
