The Noon Concert Series will present soprano, Nancy Hallas, and tenor, Donald St. Jean in concert on Wednesday, February 4 in Cecilia Hall.

Hallas and St. Jean will perform solos and duets of classical and popular tunes which include music by Vaughan Williams, Samuel Barber and Cole Porter. Bela Miller will accompany them on piano. Mrs. Hallas, a lecturer and vocal instructor at Salve Regina, is a veteran of over 700 concert dates. She has been heard in recitals, oratorios and operas throughout the United States and has performed at Carnegie Hall on numerous occasions.

Mr. St. Jean, a vocal instructor at Salve Regina and Providence College, has performed extensively throughout New England. He has performed locally as a soloist with the Swanhurst Chorus, Providence Singers and the Rhode Island Civic Chorale. St. Jean holds a master of music degree in voice from the New England Conservatory of Music.

The hour-long performance will begin at noon in Cecilia Hall, located in Carey Mansion on Ruggles Avenue. Patrons are encouraged to bring a lunch to the concert, which is free and open to the public.

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### SALVE TO HOST CHAMBER MUSIC FESTIVAL

Salve will host a Chamber Music Festival for high school musicians on Saturday, February 7 from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in Ochre Court's State Dining Room. The entire day's performances will be open to the public, free of charge.

High school musicians from Rhode Island and Massachusetts, invited by Salve's Music Department, will perform in small ensembles. Although numerous opportunities exist for larger ensembles and orchestras, few festivals cater to the smaller groups consisting of three to ten players.

While at Salve the students will not only perform before one another and a general audience, but their talents will be evaluated as well. Violoncellist Bruce Coppock and clarinetist Thomas Hill will serve as official evaluators. Both musicians are from the Boston Chamber Music Society.

### O'HARE LECTURE SERIES TO PRESENT HARVARD PROFESSOR, DR. IRVEN DEVORE

Salve's O'Hare Lecture Series will present Dr. Irven DeVore on Wednesday, February 4 at 7:30 p.m. in the College's O'Hare Academic Center. DeVore, professor of anthropology and biology at Harvard University, will speak on "The Male - Female Relationship: An Illustrated Lecture and Discussion." The lecture is free and open to the public.

In his presentation, DeVore will discuss the wide range of social arrangements humans have devised for marriage and the care of offspring. According to DeVore, the human species seem to be subject to many of the same principles and constraints that apply to other species. He will conclude his talk with a consideration of how basic principles of evolution and vertebrate behavioral ecology can or cannot be applied to human behavior and social organization.

DeVore's original fieldwork was on the behavior and ecology of baboons in Kenya. He is currently co-director of the Ituri Project, an intensive study of the Efe (pigmy hunter-gatherers) and Lese (horticultural villages) of the Ituri Forest of Zaire. DeVore holds a Ph.D. in anthropology from the University of Chicago and is considered one of the most popular professors at Harvard.

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## FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Arthur Frankel, Professor of Psychology, and Dr. Melvin Snyder, Rutgers University, are coauthors of a paper entitled "The Dual Functions of Self-handicapping: Egotism and a Principle of Pleasure," recently presented at the Fifth Annual Adelphi University Applied Experimental Psychology Conference. The paper describes research indicating that people handicap themselves not only to protect self-esteem when confronted with the possibility of failure but also to increase pleasure by making situations more challenging.
