SALVE TO HOLD THIRTY-SEVENTH COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES PRECEDED BY MAGISTERIAL, BACCALAUREATE CEREMONIES

Salve Regina will hold its thirty-seventh commencement exercises Sunday, May 17 at 10:00 a.m. on the east lawn of the O'Hare Academic Center. Five hundred and sixty-three degrees will be conferred under a tent nearly 23,000 square feet in size standing adjacent to Newport's scenic Cliff Walk.

Sister Lucille McKillop, President of Salve Regina, will address this year's graduating class with the Commencement Message and the Most Reverend Louis E. Gelineau, Bishop of Providence, will give the benediction. Scheduled to attend are Rhode Island Governor Edward D. DiPrete and Newport Mayor Patrick Kirby.

Two hundred and fifty-one students will receive master's degrees, 302 will receive bachelor degrees and four will be awarded associate degrees.

Receiving honorary degrees will be Mr. James C. Colton of Newport who has been Salve Regina's treasurer since 1972, and Sister Marie Andre Guay of Pawtucket, a former member of the College's board of trustees.

Mr. Colton will be awarded the degree of Doctor of Business Administration and will be cited for his dedication and service to the College as treasurer as well as his service to the community-at-large.

Sister Guay will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters for her contributions in the field of education.

The Magisterial Hooding Service will be celebrated at St. Joseph's Church in Newport on Wednesday, May 13 at 7:00 p.m. The Baccalaureate Mass will be celebrated on Saturday, May 16 at 2:00 p.m., under the tent on the Salve campus. MAY 9 CONFERENCE ON ETHICS PROMISES EXCITEMENT

Stockbrokers making millions on the basis of illegal insider knowledge. Highranking government officials conspiring to cover up covert operations that contravene the laws. Bankers laundering Mafia money. Judges "on the take."

Are the institutions of American society in an advanced stage of "moral dry rot?" Or is our outrage at such behavior evidence to the contrary? If there is a problem, what can we do about it? Given our complex, pluralistic society, should we even try to teach standards of ethical behavior? Is more legislation a better answer?

These questions, and more, will be on the agenda on May 9, when the Newport Institute will present a conference on the topic: "The Decline of Ethics in American Life: How Can We Reverse It?" The lineup of speakers is an exciting one. Ms. Arlene Violet, former Rhode Island Attorney General, has chosen a suggestive title, "Darkroom Techniques", for her remarks. "The Pot and the Kettle: A Parable of Three Cities (Tehran, Washington, Managua)" is the topic of the second speaker, Fr. Francis X. Winters, S.J., of Georgetown's School of Foreign Service. The final speaker will be Ms. Mary Joan Hoene, Deputy Director of the Investment Management Division of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Her talk is entitled "Ethics in the Marketplace." The Conference Moderator will be Salve Regina's own Dr. Frank Maguire.

There will be plenty of time for questions and comments from the audience as well as an opportunity, in small group forums, to discuss in depth the issues raised. The conference will be held in the T.B. Room from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Admission is free for Salve Regina students, faculty and staff. General admission is \$25 in advance and \$30 at the door. Coffee and danish will be available in the O'Hare lobby at 8:30 and a buffet lunch will be served in Miley Hall at 12:30. Lunch tickets will cost \$5.00. All participants were free at all times to converse with anyone and to ask any question of church and government officials or of the citizenry.
