NOON CONCERT SERIES TO FEATURE VIOLINIST ARTURO DELMONI

Salve Regina's Noon Concert Series will feature violinist Arturo Delmoni on Wednesday, November 4, in Cecilia Hall.

Delmoni will perform an unaccompanied Bach sonata and the Giuliani "Grand Sonata," accompanied by classical guitarist and Salve Regina music instructor Dennis Costa.

With a repertory that encompasses twenty-nine concertos, more than fifty sonatas and numerous romantic recital and encore pieces, Delmoni has appeared as soloist with the St. Louis, Dallas, Spokane, El Paso, Glendale and Tucson Symphonies, the California Chamber Symphony, Little Orchestra Society, the Brooklyn and Kansas City Philharmonics and the Boston Pops.

As a chamber musician, Delmoni has performed with such illustrious musicians as Pinchas Zukerman, Elmar Oliveira, Emanuel Ax, Nathaniel Rosen and Jeffrey Kahane. He is a founding member of the chamber group Boston Artists' Ensemble and has been a frequent guest of the Boston Chamber Music Society.

Delmoni's musical training began at age four with violin lessons from Dorothy DeLay of the Juilliard School. By the time he entered Juilliard as a Naumburg Scholarship student, his public career had already begun with recitals and a nationwide television appearance.

The Noon Concert Series, held every first Wednesday of the month during the academic year, is free of charge and open to the public. The performance will begin promptly at noon and end at 12:50 p.m. Patrons are encouraged to bring a lunch. Coffee will be available. 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CERCLE FRANCAIS TO HOST PHOTO EXHIBITION

The Cercle Francais will host an exhibition from the French Cultural Service from November 4 through November 30. The exhibit, a collection of 144 photographs, focuses on the 300-year history of the Comedie Francaise, the national French theater company, from its origins at the court of Louis XIV to the twentieth century. The exhibit should serve as an excellent backdrop to the Theatre Department's presentation of Moliere's "Tartuffe" in mid-November. It was Moliere's acting troupe, along with the troupe from the Hotel au Bourgogne that originally became the Comedie Francaise in the seventeenth century. The place and time for the exhibit will be announced and posted.

The Cercle Francais also announces the selection of Rosalba Orofrio as its president for the 1987-88 academic year.

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CONFERENCE ON "AIDS AND PUBLIC POLICY"

On Saturday, November 21, Salve Regina College and the Newport Institute will present a conference on the topic: "AIDS and Public Policy."

To date, most of the public discussion of the problem of AIDS has focused on the moral and ethical questions surrounding both the transmission and treatment of the disease and the medical research being conducted to control or eliminate it. These are very important issues, but few people are looking beyond to the even more difficult questions. If no cure is found in the next few years and AIDS continues to spread among the general population, what happens to the U.S. economy if a significant number of our workers are sick or dying? Would Federal funds earmarked for other programs have to be diverted to cope with the effects of such a pandemic? How should we set the priorities? How will the "fabric" of our society hold up under such strains? These are the kinds of questions to be addressed on November 21.

Offering their views on these difficult but vital questions will be three experts from Washington, D.C.: Dr. Cecil Fox of the National Institute of Health, Mr. Mauro Montoya of the Whitman-Walker Clinic, and Congressman William Dannemeyer of California. Governor Dukakis of Massachusetts has also been invited to speak but has not yet responded.

The conference will be held in the O'Hare Auditorium from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and is open to the entire College community as well as to the general public. Dr. Camille Allen, Education Department, has been elected President of the Rhode Island Association of Teacher Educators. Dr. Alice Graham, Assistant Professor of Special Education, recently gave a presentation at the Third Northeast International Symposium on Exceptional Children and Youth in Bangor, Maine. Her presentation, "Continuing Education: An Opportunity for All," focused on Salve Regina's Continuing Education Center for Exceptional Adults.

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Dr. John McNiff, F.S.C., Chairperson of the English Department, had a third article accepted by De La Salle University's Humanities Review, "Dialogue." This article was a study of William Faulkner and Gabriel Marquez' use of imaginary countries such as Yoknapatawpha and Macondo as microcosms of national struggle.

Brother John hopes to have an additional article published next spring. All the articles are interconnected and based on his doctoral thesis, which involved a study of the evolution of the American short story.

She lectured to the Voice Identification seminar on topics including the application of phonetics to voice i.d. and the training of voice examiners.

Additionally, she passed her final exams to qualify as a practicing examiner. Her reappointment to the Voice I.D. Certification Board was reaffirmed for 1988.

Dr. Troendle was also pleased to learn that efforts are being made across the country to encourage colleges to offer courses in Voice Identification similar to those pioneered by her at Salve Regina.
