A closing reception will be held in the gallery on Saturday, February 27 from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. The exhibition is being held in conjunction with the Woman Connection Conference III, to be held February 25-27. On Friday the 26th, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., the artists will give a talk in the McKillop Gallery.

Ms. Jahoda, a resident of New York City, is an MFA graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD). She has an extensive exhibition history which includes one-woman shows in New York, London, Paris, Venice and Basel (Switzerland).

Ms. McPhee also holds an MFA from RISD, as well as an undergraduate degree in art history from Princetown University. In addition to an extensive exhibition history, which includes several awards for artistic merit, Ms. McPhee has also lectured nationwide.
