Patinkin's lecture, "God's Wars: Belfast, India and Beirut," will focus on his experiences when he traveled to Northern Ireland, India and Beirut to do a series of articles on religious violence for the "Providence Journal-Bulletin." The series was one of two finalists from the "Providence Journal" for the 1987 Pulitzer Prize in international reporting.
