SRC CHEMISTRY STUDENTS EXCEL!

Congratulations to the Chemistry Department for their fine achievements this year. As reported earlier in the NEWSBULLETIN, senior Nicole Arabolos was awarded a full tuition scholarship to study for her Ph.D. in chemistry from Brown University. She also received a \$9,500 graduate teaching assistantship from Brown University Graduate School.

Carol LaSalle, also a senior, was offered a full tuition Fellowship to pursue doctoral studies at Princeton University, which includes an annual stipend of \$10,000. She also received an "Outstanding Student Award" from the New England Section of the American Institute of Chemists on April 28th, 1988 in Boston.

Seniors Kim Matus and April Gray are the recipients of a full tuition Fellowship to study for the Ph.D. in chemistry at North Carolina University. They will also receive a \$10,700 Teaching Fellowship from the University.

Melissa Twiss, a junior majoring in chemistry, has been awarded an appointment by the U.S. Department of Energy to participate in the "Science and Engineering Research Semester" during the fall semester. Melissa will be engaged in research currently underway at either the Pacific Northwest Laboratory or Argonne National Laboratory. The appointment, which emphasizes hands-on scientific and engineering investigations supplemented by seminars and workshops, includes all travel and housing expenses plus a weekly stipend. Melissa is one of approximately one-hundred students selected from applicants throughout the United States.

COLLEGE RECEIVES SAILBOAT

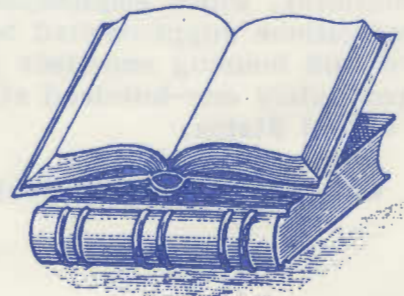
The Development Office has announced the receipt of a 420 Sailboat from Mr. John Kolius of Darien, Connecticut. The donation will benefit the sailing program.
