"CREATIVITY AND MADNESS" IS TOPIC OF ATWOOD LECTURE

Dr. Arnold Ludwig, nationally renowned psychiatrist, will speak on the topic "Creativity and Madness" at the College's Atwood Lecture in Humanities on Thursday, October 20 at 7:30 p.m. The lecture will take place in the O'Hare auditorium.

Dr. Ludwig, trained at Swarthmore College and the University of Pennsylvania, is the Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Kentucky Medical School. A prolific author, Dr. Ludwig's publications include "The Mystery of Life" and "The Importance of Lying."

Dr. Ludwig is the father of Daniel Ludwig, Assistant Professor of Art at Salve Regina College.

The lecture, which is open to the public free of charge, is supported by a grant from the Oliver S. and Jennie R. Donaldson Charitable Trust.
