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

CHARLESTON STRING QUARTET WILL PLAY AT NOON CONCERT SERIES

The award-winning Charleston String Quartet, from Brown University, will play in Cecilia Hall, at Carey Mansion, on Wednesday, November 2. The quartet features Charles Sherba and Lois Finkel on violin, Daniel Harp on cello and Consuelo Sherba on the viola. The Noon Concert is open to the public, and admission is free.

The quartet will perform works by Schubert, Bocceriani, Suk and Wolf. Their awards include a Fourth Ellen Knowles Harcourt Award (1987) and a 1986 West Virginia Governor's Honor for outstanding music contribution to that state. The group has performed throughout the United States including concerts in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. The Charleston String Quartet made its European debut in Paris in 1987. Summer festival appearances include the Aspen Music Festival, in Colorado, and the Grand Teton Festival in Wyoming.

Acclaimed for their depth of sound and interest in new music, the Charleston String Quartet has become known for their expressive style and rapport with their audiences. Partial funding for this program was provided by the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts.


